Oh, and his love of people shows in his wonderful smile!



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### NOTES FROM THE BOARD MEETING

The PBL Board of Directors met on June 20 at 3 pm at Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom. All Directors were present (Treasurer Hal Eide on Zoom) along with Manager Nancy Barlow and Assistant Manager Maya Landa. The Board approved the May 16 minutes. Manager Nancy Barlow gave her Manager's Report.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS

Director Charlie Cannone reported that the Finance Committee reviewed the April Financials. They suggested that contracts greater than \$10K be reviewed every three years. Charlie also reported that the CAP committee approved Suzanne Merrick as recording secretary and Laureen King as corresponding secretary. A suggestion sent via email is that swim lines be installed when the Clubhouse 2 pool is refurbished.

Secretary Bob Wilt reported that the ACC reviewed 18 applications; 3 were denied.

Director Cliff Cole reported that the LCC reinspects houses that have received a letter. Members are using the smart web to upload pictures.

President Jim Czizik reported that the golf course is open from 7 am to 7 pm during the off season. During season, Day Captains lock up the Golf Clubhouse at 5 pm.

#### NEW BUSINESS

Director Charlie Cannone's motion to approve the April 2023 Financials was passed.

Secretary Bob Wilt presented a motion on the ACC policy revision on patios: no picket fences or gates allowed. If there is a gate its latch must be accessible to the fire department. The motion passed. Bob also submitted James McNamara as a new member for approval. The motion passed.

Director Holly Massman submitted a motion to approve Viviane Dietschy as chairperson and Rose Ann Roche as co-chairperson of the Section Leaders to replace Gail Hogue. The Board approved.

President Jim Czizik presented 8 properties from the Fining Appeals Committee. The Board approved.

Jim went on to explain that the pool monitors are not working out at this time. Residents are complaining. The monitors may be reinitiated during the season, probably at Clubhouse 2 and 3.

Jim also reported that the City is asking for residents to volunteer to promote the City. The City did away with the Chamber of Commerce several years ago. Anyone interested in volunteering should see the Blast and channel 63 for contact information. Rose Luke

### **BOARD WORKSHOP - June 6**

The Board of Directors and Manager Nancy Barlow met for a workshop on June 6, 2023, in Clubhouse 3 and on Zoom at 3pm. Hal Eide was on Zoom; all other members were present.

President Jim Czizik started off with the first agenda item, Golf Shop seasonal hours. A discussion on why the golf shop has different hours than the other clubhouses began. Cliff Cole commented that there is a distinction between the golf course and the building. Since the building is like the gym, why would it not be open at the same hours as every other building in the community? Cliff continued with a Golf course related topic. He was upset by an article in this month's Leisureville news that said going forward, the golf committee is going to charge renters \$100 every time they renew a lease. Now the \$100 that a renter must pay now always perplexed Cliff because there is no distinction between a renter and an owner. The renter has the exact same rights as an owner and if we are not charging owners, why do we segregate out the renters? We are segregating 10% of the community. He does not think we should be doing that. Renters participate in everything and are welcome contributors to the community. Jim Czizik asked do we have any idea where that \$100 fee originated or is it just a legacy thing? He suggested the board look into the reason for the fee. Jim disagrees with the \$100 one-time fee and the \$100 fee annually. The Board needs to have a discussion on this further. Ed DeFilippis advised that the automatic locking system shuts the main gate that goes into the patio at 7:00 pm. It is open at 6:30 am. The golf shop will automatically shut down at 7:00 pm. After 7pm those that are there that start to play golf, exit through the green door which is next to the 18th. Nancy Barlow confirmed the card swipe access at the golf shop is cut off at 7:00 o'clock.

and the golf committee went to the expense of putting the tree in and the individuals that provided the tree are saying that a plaque should be put on the tree. The concern is what are the criteria that we believe that individuals that want to memorialize somebody must adhere to if they are expecting that the association is picking up the cost of that memorial. Folks in the past have paid for a tree and the plaque with the golf committee, and that has been the standard you want it, you front it and it goes up before the committee and then it goes up before the board as our bylaws or our guiding rules say that everything has to go through the board for acceptance. I'd like to hear other board members' opinions. We need to have some sort of understanding if you are going to do that, you'd have to be a committee raising the money. Go to the responsible committee or those folks that should be the first line of approval finalized with the board and then put it in. All funding should go through that committee with no monies coming out of the association.

Nancy Barlow provided an update on R1 and R2 pools. They should start filing R2 by Friday. It was delayed about a week because the last resurfacing job put tile on top of tile, and they had to remove. It will be another 29 days before we are able to start swimming.

At R1 pool we are getting closer. Nancy had two engineers come out regarding design. The tough part of this is finding a pool company that is large enough and has an engineer in house, but not too large that will touch a job this small. I have got two people that have come out. I have met with two engineers as recently as last Tuesday and Friday. She has another one coming out next week. The biggest problem we have had is we have no double gates there. We could not do the soil sample right next to the pool; all the engineers have been about the soil sample. But there is no way to get the machinery in on the pool deck. Pool 1 was still suitable, obviously the cracks are causing leaks, we are losing water, but I think we can hold tight. All three coolers and heaters are holding on with band-aid fixers. Nancy is just trying to keep it going until Pool 2 opens and then we're probably going to end up just shutting down Pool 1 just due to the equipment failures.

Charlie Cannone provided an update on the Community Advisory Panel. One recommendation from the residents to the board is the next topic that's going to be on the agenda, which is lap swimming at R2. It is suggested that since we are renovating R2 pool and it is the designated lap pool for the community, we should add swim lines to the pool. Next meeting is in July. We need to get the word out better to the community to be able to get more people to respond and tell us what they want.

Jim Czizik followed up with the concern was to not put lines across the whole pool because in doing that it makes it look like the whole pool is for laps. It is suggested to start with two lanes using rope lines and specifying a certain time. One of our board members is putting together new pool rules for lap swimming.

Jim moved onto Community Census. Every two years, we are required to do a census. Campbell is in the process of starting up the census for the community. Nancy Barlow explained some of the challenges that we have this year.

The state of Florida does not require us to register anymore, but the federal government requires us to have recent numbers. Even though we have everyone's driver's license and age when people purchase a home, which is not good enough, by law, we must send a census letter out. Nancy would like Randall to look at it just to make sure he finds it to be OK. The most recent letter asked for you to show your driver's license, birth certificate, passport, your proof of age. There is also a survey verification form that you can sign that says this is my age. If we find out that people must come in with their driver's license or some kind of proof that we need a copy of it, the logistics of having all of our Residents come in is going to be a nightmare due to the volume. Once I get the verification, Nancy feels she can overcome a lot of our issues, but there is that chance that this is not going to be valid. Nancy gave an update on the Saunas for the women and the two upgrades. Hopefully by Friday or Saturday, we should have the woman sauna up and running. Regarding the infrared versus the traditional moisture kind, the board will have to decide which direction to go. Nancy has found cost ranges anywhere between \$12 and \$16 thousand per unit. The number of infrared panels varies from each vendor, and neither one of them could tell me why. Before we move forward, Nancy would like to have someone come in and get more detailed information.

Jim moved on to memorials. We do not have a solid policy in the Community. We have had a group of residents approach the golf committee, saying that they would like to put the tree in memory of Shirley Cassa, they provided the tree. The tree is in the ground

Jim Czizik discussed the two new pool monitors that are rotating between pools one and three. The intent was for them to make sure that all residents had their ID badges. If your badges are on the tables, you can address that with them. The expectation is to thwart guests that are clearly not residents and do not have guest tags. The briefing that these young ladies received was that if a resident has their grandfather's or their father's badge and they have a guest tag, you must presume that they were there on their grandfather or father's permission. A lot of residents are upset because they don't bring their badge, and somebody lets them in. We ask you to please bring your badge or to get your own badge for the purposes of security and identification. We would absolutely welcome your candid comments aimed at trying to improve the process.

Nancy commented that there is not a set time because we're kind of keeping the element of surprise. They are coming seven days a week. We do not ask them to confront residents that start getting resistant; they are to back away, and then we will take care of it on our end. Jim stated, "These folks are not there to intimidate anybody or to upset you. They are there in response to residents clamoring to have somebody check pool passes. It behooves all of us to help these young people out.

If you see somebody hassling these folks and they are just trying to do their job, they're not trying to bully anybody, see if you can quell it." Nancy added that people who are not supposed to be on property are a liability. These days and times, she thinks that you have to be very, very careful who's on your property.

Jim made a courtesy announcement that Saturday, June 10th, representatives from the City of Boynton Beach will be here giving their overview of Hurricane Prep. It will be administered by Dave Haines from CERT. Teams will be out here rolling out the plan for the Community as well as the individuals that are here from Boynton Beach, the same individual that is coming out to do the hurricane prep, is also the lead for permits. If you have any concerns or questions about the timeline and the process and an understanding of what needs to be permitted, this is the perfect opportunity for you to be here this Saturday.

### MANAGEMENT REPORT June 2023 NON-COMPLIANCE VIOLATION FINES

Due to the amount of homeowner non-compliance to notification of violations of the governing documents, the Fining Appeal Committee and Management are moving forward with the stricter process in following the Florida Statutes. PBL traditionally has given much lead way, but due to this courtesy, the non-compliance of homeowners has risen. Therefore, moving forward, fines will not be removed once they are applied and the rights of the member(s), or the member's tenant(s), guest(s) or invitee(s), to use common areas and facilities will be suspended. All work must be completed 7 days prior to the Fining Appeal Committee meeting that approves the fine. As an FYI, the Florida Statutes and our governing documents require The Board of Directors assign the fine(s) and the Fining Appeal Committee approves the fine(s) after having all facts and letters before them. Please note the next Fining Appeal Committee meeting is July 18, 2023. If you received a Fining Appeal Hearing notice, please call the office if you have any questions. We appreciate many of you who are proactive in keeping your homes in compliance, work with us to identify a plan, and for providing feedback. Thank you! ACC Approval for Exterior Modifications - Please remember you must obtain ACC approvals for any exterior modifications made to your home. Work is being done without approval or applications are being submitted after the work is completed. Regardless of the need for a city permit, you must submit an application to the ACC. It is the homeowner's responsibility to make sure the application is completed and approved, not the contractor. If your neighbor has a modification that you would like for your home, do not assume they received approval. Applications are available at the admin office. We will be happy to assist you on any questions you might have on the application process.

### Golden Age Of Hollywood - Grace Kelly



Born Grace Patricia Kelly on November 12, 1929, in Philadelphia she was sired by 3-time U.S. Olympic gold medalist in rowing John Brendan Kelly he was a self-made millionaire from a successful business in bricks. Her mother Margaret Katherine Maher was a college athletic coach at the University of Pennsylvania. Grace was the third of four children. Showing great

proclivity to performance Grace participated in school plays and community productions. She also modeled with her mother and sister. In high school Grace dreamed about acting. One of her uncles was a performer in Vaudeville and the other, George Kelly a prize-winning playwright. Both men influenced her in her acting pursuits. George would encourage his niece to pursue a full-time acting career and mentored her during her rise in Hollywood.

Upon conclusion of her high school years Grace decided to pursue acting in New York. Her father "Jack" was not pleased as he thought acting was just a cut above being a streetwalker. Undaunted Grace enrolled in the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. To sustain herself Grace modeled and would appear in ads for Old Gold cigarettes and on covers of Red Book and Cosmopolitan. In her last performance at the Academy, she appeared in *A Philadelphia Story* which she would reprise after the Hepburn-Grant original in 1956 renamed *High Society* with Bing Crosby. Grace would win a gold record award for her song True Love.

Seeking roles on Broadway the going was tough initially as one of her directors would state that she had great looks and style but lacked "vocal horsepower." Not to worry Grace found out that film would be more in keeping with her talents and she moved to Hollywood. Her anthology would include 11 feature films and over 60 productions on television.

Gary Cooper discovered her on the set of her first film at 22 in *Fourteen Hours* in 1951. He arranged for her to play his very young Quaker wife in the following year's *High Noon*. The acclaimed western put her on the road to stardom. Her next film *Mogambo* the following year had her playing opposite Clark Gable and Ava Gardner. Grace had an affair with Clark later claiming: "What else is there to do if you're alone in a tent in Africa with Clark Gable?" The film marked a turning point for the young actress as she was nominated for a best supporting actress Academy Award and won a Golden Globe for her portrayal. On the heels of that film MGM offered her a 7-year contract, which she accepted with the provision that she could live in New York every other year to pursue stage work.

- #6 "On time" is when you get there.
- #7 Even duct tape can't fix stupid, but it sure does muffle the sound.

In 1954's *The Country Girl* she won her first Best Actress Oscar portraying against type as a frowzy wife of an alcoholic Bing Crosby. Her most memorable works were with famed director Alfred Hitchcock. The first portraying an adulterous wife alongside Ray Milland as her scheming husband that plotted her death. It was a memorable mystery characterized by the "MacGuffin" originated by Angus MacPhail and often used in Hitchcock films. The device was of little importance by itself but carried significance in the movie. For this film the object was a key. A worthwhile look if you haven't seen it.

In that same year, 1954, she would costar with James Stewart in *Rear Window* in what is still considered in the top ten films of all time. You may recall the story where Stewart, a news photographer, is sidelined in a full leg cast and his only recourse is to watch his neighbors in their day-to-day existence. Grace, playing his adoring fashion designer beloved helps him solve the murder mystery that has unfolded right in front of his rear window. Six-time Academy Award nominee Thelma Ritter costars as Stewart's visiting nurse.

In the very next year, she teamed with heart throb Cary Grant in another Hitchcock thriller, *To Catch A Thief.* The film, rife with double entendre, made Hitchcock dub Kelly his heroine and star, possessing what he called "sexual elegance." Grace followed with two more films in 1956, *The Swan* and *High Society.* She would then retire from Hollywood and marry Prince Rainier and become the Princess of Monaco where she would bear three children Caroline, Albert, and Stefanie. Hollywood didn't give up in their pursuit of her and initially she agreed to do another Hitchcock film in 1964, *Marnie* but she withdrew. Grace would provide narration to several documentaries and would lend her voice to poetry readings. In 1976 she would agree to join the board of directors of Twentieth Century Fox.

On September 13, 1982, she would suffer a stroke while at the wheel of her car, driving on a winding road in the Cote d'Azur in

France. She and her daughter Stephanie plummeted down a 45-foot embankment. Stephanie suffered only minor injuries, but Grace would perish the next day.

Grace continues to be an iconic beauty and her photographs dot the landscape of publications and social media to this very day. Her devotion to charitable causes like the Red Cross was a major supporter of up and rising stars in film, theater, and dance.


On Friday, Marcia and Vickie sorted and bargained priced items in the heat of the day.



- · When you receive your Notice to Paint from the painter, remove all window screens, close and lock all windows and doors, and place a rolled-up towel on each window sill and underneath all doors to prevent water from seeping in.
- Remove all furniture and personal items from your porch, patio and store these items inside your home or garage.
- Park all vehicles in your garage. If this is not possible, remove vehicles from your driveway or in front of your house to prevent over-spray.





### A Message From Your CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Palm Beach Leisureville

It's that time when folks leave and head north! Please read the following:

Should our area experience a hurricane or any other type of disaster, there are trained folks in our community who work under the Boynton Beach Fire Department.

It is never too early to prepare the exterior of your home for tropical storms or hurricanes. We are quickly approaching the beginning of the hurricane season. Our team is here to not only access and assist if necessary, but also to ensure our community is ready should we encounter any type of major storm.

All residents who live here full time or expect to be here should have the orange magnet. If not, they are available at the Leisureville office. If we have been issued a Hurricane Warning and you are planning on staying in your home, place the magnet on your front door. CERT members will be riding around prior to the storm and documenting all residents who have remained. After the storm has passed remove the magnet as soon as it is safe to go outside. Our team members will be driving around, not only to check for magnets but to assess possible damage. If you have left your magnet on the door, they will attempt to reach you. If they do not get an answer, they will attempt to enter the house as this is an indication you may have a physical problem.

Now is the time to prepare your property. If you are leaving for the season, NOTHING is to remain outside your home. Patio furniture, all potted plants, decorative items, roof tiles, bags of dirt, bikes, grills, trash and recycle bins, etc. must be stored inside your home or garage. Many of these items are not supposed to be on the exterior of your property at any time. If you have a carport, you need to remove any items that are light enough to be picked up by the wind. The only item that is acceptable is your car. If you have a neighbor or property manager looking after your home, please alert them in case you forget any items.

All trees should be trimmed and thinned out for the hurricane season. All property debris and items from your home should be put in the trash now. This is the time to clean out and trim back.

In the past, our members drove around for two days advising your neighbors, and possibly you, of items that become dangerous during a storm. This is not the responsibility of CERT. If you wait until the last minute to cut your trees, or rid your house and yard of debris or any other type of clean-out/clean-up, this creates a problem. Many residents put out large pieces of trash and clippings from trees and bushes when they hear a storm is coming. If the city has already issued an advisory they may not be collecting. These items become projectiles in a storm.

We hear this is the time to gather your supplies, this is the time to prepare your home and yard. All Leisureville volunteer members of CERT live in our community, have city issued badges and most likely will have large magnets on their vehicles identifying themselves as CERT members. They may also have vests on with the words CERT. We communicate with each other via radios. We do not help prepare your home or yard. We are there to assist should there be an emergency and the fire department and/or police are not able to gain access to our community.


